# SUSTAINING THE CHURCH

September includes three significant festival days, which punctuate and help to shape the latter half of the month.

**Holy Cross Day** (Sept. 14) considers and celebrates the Cross of Christ as His victory over sin, death, the devil and hell, the Hour of His Glory as our Lord and Savior, and the way and means whereby He calls all people to repentance and faith in Him. That same Cross also marks the life of His disciples and His whole Church on earth, as we follow after Him and share in His sufferings in the sure and certain hope of His Resurrection.

**The Feast of St. Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist** (Sept. 21) confesses that the Church is sustained in faith and life under the Cross by the Word of Christ and the ministry of His Gospel. St. Matthew

was himself called away from an occupation of worldly wealth and riches to suffer and die for the sake of the Lord Jesus Christ. Yet, on that way of the Cross, he was given the privilege, not only of preaching and serving the Gospel in his lifetime, but of writing down by inspiration of the Holy Spirit the very Words and works of Christ Jesus, by which the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church around the world is catechized and given life with God in Christ.

Bearing the Cross of Christ brings the devil's wrath upon us, and we are not strong enough to survive his attacks. However, **the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels** (Sept. 29) proclaims that the holy angels of God are "ministering spirits sent out to serve for the sake of those who are to inherit salvation" (Heb. 1:14). Their protection of the Lord's people is beautifully confessed in Philipp Melancthon's hymn, "Lord God, to Thee We Give All Praise" (*LSB* 522). Although "the ancient dragon" is our foe, "a roaring lion" who seeks to slay and devour us with his deceptions and his constant efforts "to undermine both Church and state," the angel band is always watchful and guards the people of Christ against the devil's lies.

The holy angels "never rest nor sleep as we," but, delighting in the Lord Jesus, by day as by night they keep His "little flock," His "lambs and sheep" in safety and peace by His Word.

# Celebrating 175 YEARS

It was the summer of 1843 that F.C.D Wyneken had returned from a mission trip to Germany to appeal to Pastor Wilhelm Loehe of Bavaria for more Lutheran pastors and support funds for the Lutheran churches in the German settlements of northeast Indiana. Pastor Loehe was enthusiastic for the request and urged Wyneken to tighten the reformed influences in the Lutheran churches and begin bringing those churches back to a conservative and orthodox liturgical worship. Wyneken traveled throughout the northeast Indiana region, seeking German farming communities and bringing them together to form orthodox Lutheran churches.

In 1844, Wyneken's missionary efforts reached a small German farming settlement on the southern edge of the newly borne town of Columbia City in

Whitley County. At least nine families came together and began to worship in each other's homes with frequent visits by Wyneken. By 1846, a year after Wyneken took a call to St. Paul, Baltimore, Md., the prairie church in the corn fields of Columbia City grew and began to build its first sanctuary. In 1847, the first timbered sanctuary was built on the eastern end of the Sievers Family farmstead and was led in worship by Rev. Dr. August Wolter from the new Concordia Theological Seminary (CTS) in Fort Wayne. That same year, the congregation named the church *Lutherische St. Johannes Kirche* and was formally under the following members: Henry Brueggemann, William Luecke, Christian Pook, Friedrich Kehmeyer, Louis Schwinehart, Friedrich Dreyer, Carl Brandt, Ernest Brueggemann, William Sievers, Christian Luecke, Henry

Hauptmeyer, William Schaper, and William Pieper. The first communion records show that 12 men and 12 women participated.

After the formation of *Die Deutsche Evangelisch-Lutherische Synode von Missouri, Ohio und andern Staaten* (later known as The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod) and during the Synod's convention in Fort Wayne in 1849, St. John's Lutheran Church became a chartered member of the new German synod, along with several other Lutheran churches throughout the northeast Indiana region. The first 13 years of St. John's were led by non-resident pastors Revs. Dr. August Wolter (1847-49), Anton Stecher (1849-51) and Julius Frederick (1851-61).

By 1860, St. John's was continuously growing and was able to call their own pastor. They built a log parsonage on the southwest edge of the property and called Rev. Christian Reichardt (1861-74) to be their first resident pastor. In 1875, St. John's called Rev. C.F. Seitz (1875-82) to the growing congregation, now recording 75 communicant members. A larger sanctuary was required and construction of a new brick sanctuary was completed in 1878. The sanctuary included wood burning stoves and two kerosene lamps in brass brackets in each of the eight high arching windows.

In 1883, the congregation experienced a doctrinal divide over predestination. This public disagreement caused St. John's to divide into two different congregations. Members who sided with the Ohio Synod's stance on the doctrine remained at St. John's and joined the Ohio Synod, and the remaining members who sided with C.F.W. Walther and the Missouri Synod's stance left and formed a new congregation a half mile east of St. John's and chartered themselves as St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church. During its 34-year divide, St. John's Lutheran Church of the Ohio Synod was led by 10 pastors: Revs. Sam Hunziker (1883-93), G. Sutter (1893-94), P.E. Mahlberg (1894-97), F.C. Re-

itz (1897-1900), Rudolph Otto (1900-07), B.F. Brandt (1907-08), F.J. Schultz (1908-11), W.A. Grimm (1911-12, 1914-17) and George Wolf (1913-14). St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Missouri Synod was led by Revs. Traugott Thieme (1883-88) and Henry Jungkuntz (1889-1917). In order to encourage their pastors to have large families, the old log parsonage was upgraded in 1908 to a four-bedroom house and was relocated from the southwestern corner of the cemetery to its present location at the northwestern corner next to the old timbered sanctuary, now parochial school.

In 1916, a committee was formed by the synods of Buffalo, Iowa, Ohio, Missouri and Wisconsin and sought to work an agreement for church fellowship and cooperation. As a result of this agreement, St. John's Lutheran Church and St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church amalgamated in 1917 and renamed itself as St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Missouri Synod, and called Rev. Walter Klausing (1917-22). At that time, the parochial school was relocated from its original location at the northwestern corner of the cemetery to a lot just behind the brick sanctuary. In 1922, the congregation called a new pastor who will become the longest serving pastor in the congregation's history, Rev. Val Hennig (1922-60). Pastor Hennig's granddaughter, Judy Hart, is still a prominent member of the church and leads the music ministry as one of the organists and choir director.

Until 1941, all services were conducted in German. At the time of World War II, services were being converted into English at St. John's, which also transitioned to *The Lutheran Hymnal*. In 1954, the congregation needed larger facility space and opted to build a new parish hall with classrooms for Sunday school and administration space for the pastor and the office staff. Because of the sandy nature of the soil around the sanctuary, construction took place about 12 feet from the sanctuary foundation in order to avoid collapse. In 1960, Pastor Hennig retired from the ministry and Rev. Wilbert Bok



(1960-63) was called to the congregation. Pastor Bok's daughter, Dr. Lisa Hatcher, is also a prominent member of the congregation and serves as another organist and bell choir director. Her husband, John Hatcher, serves as an elder. After Pastor Bock took a call to a congregation in Canada in 1963, St. John's was led by Revs. Eugene Graebner (1964-66), Lynn Podoll (1967-71), L.L. Kimball (1971-75) and Sigmund Hillmer (1975-85).

In 1982, the congregation transitioned to the new *Lutheran Worship* hymnals. In 1984, St. John's began its world mission effort by supporting two Haitian students from the seminary (Revs. Israel Isidor and Thomas Bernard) and continues to support them with regular monetary contributions to their ministry in Haiti.

Pastor Hillmer retired in 1985. The congregation then extended a call to Rev. Richard Laeder (1986-90). In 1990, the parsonage underwent a remodel. In 1991, Rev. David Mom-

mens accepted the call as pastor to St. John's, and he continues to serve in this role.

In 1998, the formation of a new seminary in Haiti became a reality under the leadership of Pastor Mommens. The congregation also began to support the Lutheran seminaries in Kenya and Siberia, and missions in Madagascar.

In 2001, the Building Committee conducted a feasibility study to decide whether or not to expand the parish hall, or to build a new sanctuary in order to provide more space for Sunday school. The majority of the voters favored a new sanctuary and plans were underway by 2002. Groundbreaking was held in August 2003. For two years, the bulk of the construction was led by church member Glen "Sam" Kelsey, with the assistance of fellow members Kenny Kerch, Mike Grant, Bob Kurtz, Al Germann, Larry Grable and Orville Grable. The new sanctuary was dedicated in June 2005. The old 1878 sanctuary was removed in May 2019. Its bell and cornerstone were memorialized on a free-standing brick base near the entrance in October 2020 and dedicated on Palm Sunday, April 10, of this year.

January 2022 marked the beginning of the 175th year for St. John's. Since its founding in 1847, there have been 1,297 baptisms, 580 couples married, 1,084 confirmations and 625 burials. The membership now numbers 288 baptized souls and 212 communicant members. The oldest member of the congregation is Al Germann, and the youngest member is Caroline Ashbaugh, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Ashbaugh.

St. John's continues to have various guest preachers — who have served St. John's as either pastors or vicars — proclaim the Gospel and provide presentations on their memories of St. John's. We also hosted a large-scale community event on Aug. 27, a German style folkfest and artisan bazaar in which local artisans displayed their wares. Fort Wayne Tänzer, a German folk dancing troupe, entertained us as well.

# MDFL Fall Conference
